Course Outcomes (COs):

CO1: Define public policy and explain its theoretical foundations.

Focus: Meaning, scope, significance of public policy; difference between public policy and general decision-making; major theoretical perspectives (pluralism, elitism, systems theory, public choice).

CO2: Discuss the policy cycle model. How does it help in understanding the policy process?

Focus: Stages of policy cycle (agenda-setting, formulation, adoption, implementation, evaluation); strengths and criticisms of the model; practical application.

CO3: Compare and contrast different models of public policy analysis.

Focus: Rational model, Incremental model, Institutional model, Systems model, Advocacy coalition framework; similarities, differences, advantages, limitations.

CO4: Critically examine the role of governance theories in shaping public policy.

Focus: Theories like pluralism, elitism, Marxist perspective, public choice; how these shape agenda-setting, decision-making, and implementation.

CO5: Explain the importance of policy evaluation and feedback mechanisms in public policy models.

Focus: Purpose of evaluation, models of evaluation (formative, summative, cost-benefit, evidence-based); how feedback contributes to policy improvement and accountability.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PAPER SETTER/ EXAMINER:

- 1) The syllabus prescribed should be strictly adhered to.
